Rakkasan Legend Chops It Up With Astronaut Headed To The Moon During Hall of Fame Induction

I am 5 years removed from my assignment with the 187th Infantry Regiment, but no day passes without a thought, or nod to the lessons I learned from the Veterans who set a standard of excellence, or my active duty teammates that worked to reach it every day.

While I attended the Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell Air Force Base (The academic hub for the Air Force), an opportunity presented itself. Each year, the student body selects inductees into an airpower hall of fame. The program is called, “Gathering of Eagles,” and those selected as “Eagles” join a hall of fame that include legendary astronauts, flying aces of WWII, and other Airpower pioneers. The initial class of Eagles

selected in 1982 were guys like Chuck Yeager, the first man to break the sound barrier, Neil A. Armstrong, the first human to step on the moon, and Robin Olds, the “Old Man” of MIG Killers who continued leading combat missions into North Vietnam well over the 100 mission limit.

The 2023 class added a familiar Rakkasan name to the legendary list. Brigadier General (Ret) Weldon “Tiger” Honeycutt, also known by his callsign, “BlackJack.” Brig. Gen. Honeycutt was inducted into the Airpower Hall of fame for the U.S. Air Force last week at Maxwell Air Force Base. If the only thing you know about Brig. Gen. Honeycutt, is that he commanded the legendary men of the Rakkasans during the Battle of Hamburger Hill, then you may not know why he was selected into the Air Power Hall of Fame by the Air Force. You may not know that this Rakkasan legend spearheaded helicopter tactics development during the Army’s transition from ground-based attack and transportation to “Air Mobile” doctrine which, would later evolve into current day “Air Assault” tactics. You may not know that he was a master aviator in both fixed wing and rotary wing aircraft. You may not know that he taught many notable general officers to fly, Generals like Westmoreland, Truman, and Harrell. You may not know that as the commander of the 68th Assault Helicopter Company “Top Tigers,” he flew the lead helicopter (the most vulnerable position) during every combat mission that his unit flew. You may not know that he turned back, leaving the relative safety of a formation of armed Hueys to pick up an American troop in Vietnam that was accidentally left, flying a single Huey, with no security, back into a hot landing zone to save that Soldier. You may not know that he was shot through the hull of his Huey on that mission, and while rapidly losing blood, flew the helicopter to the nearest hospital, returning himself and his crew to safety. To be honest, I did not know many of these pieces of American military history until I was given the opportunity to spend nearly eight days with Brig. Gen. Honeycutt, and his incomparable bride, Mrs. Marguerite Honeycutt, a legend in her own right.



This resume alone barely scratches the surface of what the Honeycutt's have accomplished during their time serving our country, but it is a small glimpse into why Brig. Gen. Honeycutt was selected as a 2023 Eagle. As part of Gen Honeycutt's induction, the Honeycutt's traveled to Maxwell Air Force Base, in Montgomery, Alabama, where we hosted them both and their 15 year old miniature pincher, "Missy."

Despite the heavy schedule for the week, Brig. Gen. Honeycutt found time to bond with one of his fellow eagles. Blackjack's relentless desire to seek, understand, attempt, and conquer hasn't diminished in retirement, so when he met Crew Dragon driver Captain (USN) Victor Glover of NASA's Crew-1, he felt a little closer to manning the one type of aircraft he's always wanted the chance to master.

To celebrate the inductions, the student body of over 509 Majors from each Military branch to include officers from around the world, hosted, and honored these eagles. Gen. Honeycutt who has reached the age of 92, became good friends with Capt. Glover, the current NASA astronaut that will fly to the moon in 2024. Throughout the week they would go back and forth debating how the mission to the moon would go. An example of their debate is below. I must say I am paraphrasing to the best of my ability.

Gen. Honeycutt: *"God Damn it VIC, can I call you VIC?"*

Capt Glover: *"Absolutely Sir, please call me VIC."*

Gen Honeycutt: *"Let me tell you something. Your name is already in immortality. What a thrill it would be to pilot that damn thing up there. There would be no way to know if you could make it back or not. That sounds like the ultimate challenge, and I have a lot of respect for you, for doing that."*

Capt Glover: *"Yes Sir! I have been training for this mission for many years, and I am confident that we have mitigated all the risks. After all, I will only be away from my family for 10 days."*

Gen. Honeycutt: *"Listen to this VIC, when you go up, I'll come and back you up. I've always wanted to fly on of those machines."*

Capt Glover: *"Yes, Sir, It would be an honor for you to back me up."*

Gen. Honeycutt: *"No, No, No, VIC! You must have misheard me. I said, 'You can back me up!'"*

Until Brig. Gen. Honeycutt flies to the Moon with Captian Glover, and for many years after, his picture will hang on the walls of the Air Command and Staff College as a pioneer and major contributor to Airpower and Army Aviation.

A RAK SOLID 2023

The RAK SOLID Battalion remains as SOLID as ever as we prepare for a deployment to Europe following a year of tough training and strong cohesion building events. We started 2023 with the FORSCOM GREAT Inspection, which proved monumental in the Battalion's overall score of 95.2%. RAK SOLID Soldiers received coins for excellence from BG Curtis, and Enforcer Company was presented with the XVIII Airborne Corps AAME plaque for outstanding performance.

Sappers from Akuma Company trained 90 infantrymen from across all of the 3BCT maneuver Battalions during a 4-day Rakkasans Breacher's Academy in January; familiarizing them on the construction, emplacement, and initiation of Urban Breaching demolitions, wire obstacle breaches, minimum safe distance, and demolition calculation. Akuma and Breacher's Light Equipment (LE) Platoons improved the 1-187 IN and 3-187 IN Battalions' motorpools by resurfacing the gravel lots.



In March, 16 RAK SOLID Soldiers received their Expert Soldier Badges, 1 received an Expert Infantryman Badge, and 1 received an Expert Field Medic Badge. Out of the 16 ESBs, 6 were awarded True Blues.



In April, the Battalion placed first in two competitions: the Rakkasan Fuel Competition, and the 16th Annual Best Sapper Competition. Soldiers from Enforcer Company took home first place in the Rakkasan Fuel Competition while CPT Cushing and CPT Palazini brought home the 1st Place trophy from the 16th Annual US Army Best Sapper Competition. Enforcer Company was also the first company in the entire Division to successfully sling load a TRM fueler.




The Battalion held its first internal Squad Competition – SOLID Stakes. Twenty squads participated, and Akuma 2-2, led by SSG Falk, took first place. The competition included a physical fitness assessment based on Ranger and Sapper requirements, a 7-mile ruck, land navigation, a Round Robin event which included CBRN and Patrolling lanes, MOS specific tasks, and an X-mile event.

During Week of the Eagles, our RAK SOLID Soldiers took home first place in Tug of war, Eagle Fit (all female team), Best Intel, and two of the Boxing weight classes. Behind the scenes, our Engineers rebuilt the Brigade torii in time for the annual Rakkasan Reunion, and one of our LE

platoons dug trenches for the Division’s Air Assault demonstration. During OLE III, the RAK SOLID Battalion focused heavily on preparing for a series of LFXs and sling load operations.

RAK 6 and RAK 7 observed Breacher Company firing a MICLIC, and awarded a few RAK SOLID Soldiers for their excellence during the final LFX iteration.

Soldiers worked relentlessly upon coming out of the field from OLE III to ensure the unit was prepared to deploy to Europe. After working for nearly 30 days straight, the Battalion met all deployment requirements and allowed for enough time to plan one final Hammer Event; a Platoon vs. Platoon competition at Fryar Stadium. Breacher Company won the Hammer for the third time in a row, and will transport it with them to Europe.



ASSURGAM UPDATE



626 BSB COMMANDER, LTC ALLEN TAYLOR

2023 was quite the year for the 626th Brigade Support Battalion (BSB). In January, the Assurgam Battalion welcomed back our team from some well-deserved time-off for the holiday season before diving head-first into preparation for the FORSCOM GREAT Inspection scheduled for early February. In addition to these preparation efforts, 626 BSB also conducted an Intensive Maintenance Cycle, driver's training, range density, and continued integration of our new ITN communication platform capabilities.



Upon completion of the FORSCOM GREAT Inspection, the Battalion shifted its' efforts toward preparation for Expert Soldier Badge (ESB) and Expert Field Medic Badge (EFMB) evaluations scheduled to occur in March. Additionally, Alpha Company executed a Battalion Pathfinder Low- Cost Low-Altitude (LCLA) Exercise with 5th Special Forces Group as part of their continued mission to test air delivery methods to expedite resupplies in future operations.

Aside from conducting ESB and EFMB evaluations (in which 626 BSB gained 4 new ESB and 4 new EFMB badge holders), the Battalion spent the month of March planning and executing a Battalion Staff Ride, where the team traveled to Nashville and met with leaders from the National Football League Tennessee Titans operations and support staff at Nissan Stadium to discuss their sustainment and logistics practices.



In April, the Assurgam team conducted a Battalion Military Decision-Making Process (MDMP) Staff Exercise (STAFFEX), a Battalion Base Defense Competition, a Battalion Toughness Initiative team-building event, and ended the month celebrating at the first annual Assurgam Derby Bash. Another highlight this month was the Brigade Forward Arming and Refueling Point (FARP) Competition that the BSB Support Operations (SPO) team coordinated, during which 626 BSB sling loaded a fuel Tank Rank module (TRM) for the first time ever on Fort Campbell.



May kicked off with Headquarters and Headquarters Company (HHC) Change of Command and Charlie Company conducting a Company Field Training Exercise (FTX) to finetune their Role II establishment and operation procedures. Alpha Company's Supply Support Activity (SSA) conducted their first 100% wall-to-wall inventory of the year before the Battalion spent the latter half of the month participating in all of the RAK Reunion and Week of the Eagle festivities.



In June, LTC Casey Seckendorf relinquished command of 626 BSB to LTC Allen "Jerry" Taylor just prior to the Battalion departing on summer opportunity block leave that lasted through early July.

Upon everyone's return from leave, all efforts immediately shifted to preparation efforts for Operation Lethal Eagle III (OLE III), a Division-level training exercise where the Assurgam team spent 3 weeks in the field providing various sustainment support to the Brigade.



After completion of OLE III at the end of August, the Battalion immediately shifted gears to preparing to deploy to EUCOM beginning in October to replace 1BCT, 101st while simultaneously conducting expedited field recovery tasks.

The SSA conducted another 100% wall-to-wall inventory before the end of the fiscal year, Alpha Company conducted Change of Command and Charlie Company conducted Change of Responsibility in early October, and the Battalion enjoyed a final window of opportunity leave before the Assurgam team deploys.

This past year has been quite a busy and exciting year for 2-506 IN BN “White Currahee.” The year started with a rigorous training cycle focused on individual warrior skills culminating in over 60 White Currahee Soldiers earning their Expert Infantryman, Expert Soldier, and Expert Field Medical Badges.



In April, the Battalion deployed its leaders (Squad Leaders and above) to Fola, West Virginia, to participate in a highly innovative training exercise focused on fighting future wars. They trained in the employment of advanced communication and unmanned aerial systems, seamlessly integrating these new systems into realistic training operations.

In June, the majority of the Battalion deployed to White Sands Training Area, New Mexico.

There the Battalion conducted defensive operations and successfully completed multiple complex, long range, Air Assault missions. This included aerial resupply missions and rapid troop movements. After returning from New Mexico, the Battalion went on a well-deserved two weeks of block leave.

In August, the entire Battalion deployed to the Fort Campbell Training area as a part of Operation Lethal Rakkasan. This Battalion completed advanced collective training with the Rifle Companies and Weapons Company at the squad, section, and platoon level. The Battalion was recalled from Operation Lethal Rakkasan and rapidly transitioned into to preparation for a real-world deployment to Europe.

The remainder of the year has been focused on preparing Soldiers and equipment for the upcoming deployment. In Europe, White Currahee Soldiers will be training and preparing Ukranian Soldiers in support of the United States’ mission to assure and assist our allies in the region.

IRON COMMANDER, LTC ERIK NORMAN




Greetings Fellow Rakkasans!

It's been another eventful year for the Iron Rakkasans. Iron has been busy building warriors and strengthening the Iron Family. We conducted tough Infantry training across our echelons and worked to modernize our equipment and tactics. To culminate our year, Iron will deploy to Eastern Europe in support of Operation European Assist, Deter, and Reinforce (OEADR)—our first operational deployment since Operation Southern Guardian at the Southwest Border (2019-2020). Though we have been busy, we wouldn't want it any other way.



In the fall of 2022, Iron focused on logistical and administrative exercises. We kicked off the year with the Forces Command (FORSCOM) Ground Readiness Evaluation and Assessment Team (GREAT) Inspection. The Iron Rakkasans tied for the highest score ever achieved by a Battalion. The Iron Rakkasans also fielded the Integrated Tactical Network (ITN) suite of radios, replacing our warfighter radio systems with modern technology. We closed out our administrative tasks by erecting a new Iron Torri on Kemple-Yates Field. Thanks in part to Rak Association support, this new Torri—made of Iron—will symbolize our strength for many Rakkasan generations to come.





In the spring of 2023, Iron began conducting our Infantry training progression with Squad Live Fires and Situational Training Exercises (STX). This training prepared us to assume the Contingency Response Force (CRF) mission in June of 2023 and continue our progression in August of 2023. Iron was prepared to deploy to fulfill whatever mission assigned by our nation.

Iron then participated in Operation Lethal Rakkasan (OLR)—3 BCT's mission during the August Division Training Density. Iron joined the rest of 3BCT in a two-day Joint Forcible Entry (JFE) Air Assault. Following insertion, all Platoon qualified in Platoon Live Fire Exercises and conducted Platoon and Company STX.

In early summer, Lieutenant Colonel Derrick Draper changed command of Iron Battalion with Lieutenant Colonel Erik Norman. Lieutenant Colonel Draper transitioned to service in The Old Guard. He certainly left a positive mark on the Battalion and will be missed, but Iron continues to excel.

To close out the year, Iron Battalion will deploy for the first time in over three years. Iron was selected for an incredibly challenging and important mission in Eastern Europe. It is to the credit of every Iron Rakkasan, past and present, that Iron was selected for this mission. The continued support of Rakkasans past, combined with the professionalism and determination of Rakkasans present will ensure our tradition of success. Iron is ecstatic to showcase this rich legacy in a deployed theater.

VIETNAM LEGACY

The 3/187th and 3rd Brigade arrived in the Republic of Vietnam in November and December of 1967 during Operation Eagle Thrust, with the bulk of the 3/187 th arriving the first few days of December. The majority of 1968 was spent fighting throughout the III Corps Tactical Zone, in areas such as Warzone D, the rocket belt around the Bien Hoa-Long Binh military complex, Hobo Woods, Boi Loi Woods and the Iron Triangle, to name but a few locations.

After almost a full year in Vietnam, the Rakkasans move to the I Corps Tactical Zone, officially reporting to MG Melvin Zais on the tarmac at Phu Bai on October 18, 1968 – Ready to Move, Ready to Fight. The next three years were spent primarily in the mountains west of Hue, the A Shau Valley and the Coastal Plains area in and around Phong Dien District, with a three month stint in Quang Tri Province supporting Dewey Canyon II/Lam Son 719.

During their four years in the Republic of Vietnam, the 3/187 th received the following unit awards:

How I met my Rakkasan

I joined the Army on my birthday in 1986, on the delayed entry program. Once I completed high school in June, I was off to Basic Training at Ft. Jackson SC. I later trained at Ft. Gordon GA. My first duty station was Ft. Clayton Panama - there I met my future husband and began the wild life of a Rakkasan wife.

My Rakkasan, Trent Tucker, operated under constant calmness and an air of confidence that I never saw (and still don't see) in other men. He was assigned to the 87th infantry division in Panama. Which I understood to be a sister unit to the 3/187th infantry unit at Ft. Campbell.

In Panama we spent a lot of time together and would hang out with other people from Texas and Oklahoma... in other words, Cowboy types that were ride or die personalities. After about a year or so we found ourselves talking more and a lot of it one on one. He was full of crazy stories of his childhood. Like every entertaining Texan, I thought he was embellishing but as we shared our life together I would learn that the stories were all true.

In Panama, he recalled an unlikely incident about a church camp trip to New Mexico that had me in tears laughing. He claimed to have been chased down a ski slope by a bear! He was so matter of fact in his delivery that the image of him telling the story is burned into my brain.



On his decent, 12 year old Trent spotted the bear and an immediate skier vs beast chase ensued. He swore he could feel Yogi's breath on his neck. He claimed the bear grabbed at his coat but Trent shimmied out of it as a defensive tactic and continued to barrel down the the mountain.

When he got to the bottom he explained the story to his family who just laughed off the wild tale. His dad dismissed the bear story told him to go back up the hill and retrieve his jacket. Young Trent, keeping an eye out for the beast, located the coat that had bought him the precious time needed to escape the attack and found it shredded! His family was regretful for their earlier response and he became a legend who outskied a Bear!

The more I laughed at the story, the more trouble I was in... I was falling in love with this bear evading Rakkasan.

After serving in the Army for 3 years, Kenda Tucker worked as a Pediatric ICU nurse for 30 years and proudly helped deliver over 2,000 babies in her community. She married her unforgettable Rakkasan in 1989 and they loved and laughed until his tragic passing in 2021.

Get involved with the National Rakkasan Association

Eligibility: Any Annual (with current dues paid up), Life or Charter life member in good standing may nominate another member (who is also an Annual, Life or Charter life member in good standing) to become a candidate. Prior to this year, all elections were done with mail in ballots but this year we will also utilize the website to collect nominations, declarations and votes. You can still use the mail - just be mindful that the deadline is September 20, 2021.

Step one: Nomination (two ways to do this)

1. Print out the nomination form (see below), fill in information and mail it to the association.
2. Submit the form online. rakkasanassociation.org/leadership

(You must have the prospective candidates member number so you need to make sure they are willing to serve on the board).

Step two: Declaration (This step is filled out by the potential candidate - also two ways to do it)

1. Print out the declaration form (see below), fill in the information and mail it to the association. OR
2. Submit the form online. rakkasanassociation.org/leadership

Both steps require you to submit valid member numbers - if you don't have yours handy or are unsure if you are a member (it happens), email info@rakkasanassociation.org

Without both steps completed, the attempt to either nominate or declare become void.
